

Minor in Education

Purpose

A minor in Education provides students with both a solid introduction to the field and a good overview of the basic theory and scholarship of the discipline.

Students who complete this minor will make focused observations of children or adolescents in k-12 classroom settings, explore theories of learning and development, and think critically about the origins of contemporary educational policy and practice

The minor can be accomplished with courses delivered on-campus, online, or in any combination of modes to meet student needs.
